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1. Introduction

1. Since the Consultation on Census questions began in August 2004, the General Register Office for Scotland has received numerous suggestions for new questions, and improvements to questions asked in the 2001 Census.
2. GROS has been pursuing a program of community engagement which has generated further information on what data may be of use to various groups.
3. The purpose of this paper is to publicise possible new Census questions to allow interested parties to consider these and comment. ***Inclusion in this paper does not mean that a question will be included in the 2006 Census Test or the 2011 Census.***
4. The attached test form represents our current thinking on questions for inclusion in the 2006 Census Test.
5. Based on results from our ongoing program of community liaison, question testing and consultation (including responses to this document) *we will publish our proposed draft of the 2006 Census Test Form on Friday the 30th of September 2005.* This will allow time for final comments to be received before the form is printed.

8. The Scottish Executive are conducting a separate Review of Census Ethnicity Classifications Consultation. GROS will be guided by the outcome of that consultation in formulating the ethnicity question for the 2006 Test. The question in this paper in section 3.3 is only an example and is presented in addition to the options in the Scottish Executive consultation. 9. The following pages describe the changes we propose for previous Census questions, and new questions requested during consultation.

2. Household Questions

2.1 Type of Accommodation

H1 What type of accommodation does your household occupy?

Changes: The category 'In a purpose built block of flats' now includes the text 'including '4-in-a-block' and we separately identify 'Tenements'. 'Caravan' has been split into two categories; static and mobile.

Reason for change: A number of councils requested that 'four-in-a-block' accommodation is included in the categories because in 2001 a significant number of households identified their 'four-in-a-block' and 'tenement' homes incorrectly as houses.

Gypsy Traveller groups recommended that a distinction between static and mobile caravans would be useful.

2.2 Central Heating

Reason for change: Most respondents to the consultation thought that the 2001 central heating question could be improved by asking a more specific question. The most common suggestion was for type of central heating system. We expect that the policy need for this question will diminish towards 2011 and it may be replaced by another housing question, for example on disrepair, see section 4.2. We will consult the Built Environment Statistics Advisory Committee in the near future.

2.3 Ownership of Accommodation

Change: The category 'Rents' now includes the qualifying text 'includes rent paid by benefits'.

Reason for change: There was a problem in 2001 with households who had their rent paid by benefits but counted themselves as 'Lives here rent free'.

2.4 Tenure

Change: Scottish Homes removed from first category. A new category, 'Government' has been added.

Reason for change: Communities Scotland (formerly Scottish Homes) no longer act as landlords.

'Government' has been added to cover MOD and crofting families.

We will review the categories again nearer 2011.

Reason for change: The question now recognises new legislation introducing Civil Partnerships. We expect that there may be some confusion of Civil Partnership with marriages where civil ceremonies, i.e. in Registration Offices, were performed. The question may be modified before the 2006 Census Test.

Change: The question now defines the length of long-term illness and asks about the type of health problem. Health problems described in the answer are grouped into three categories; communication, physical difficulties and mental health.

Reason for change: The original question mixed long term illness and disability and did not ask about the nature of these health problems. The Disability Rights Commission pointed out that many people who have disabilities do not consider themselves disabled. A number of Local Authorities also support this change.

“The Disability Discrimination Act defines a disabled person as a person with a physical or mental impairment which has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on their ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities.”

This is only a working draft.

The Racial Equality Scheme Implementation Group (RESIG) are due to agree a new question by November 2005 which we have agreed to follow. The Scottish Executive are currently conducting a consultation on this topic. Details can be found in the introduction to this paper. Responses to that consultation are required by Thursday 15th September 2005.

The question shown is one possible option, however the actual question to be tested will not be agreed until after the Scottish Executives consultation closes on 15 September.

Change: The previous category ‘White’ has been changed to ‘European Descent’ and includes a separate tick box for ‘Gypsy, Romany or Traveller’.

The previous category ‘Black’ has been changed to ‘African or Caribbean descent’ and includes ‘Caribbean’, ‘African’ and ‘American/Canadian’

Reason for change: The 2001 question, which was a mixture of colour and nationality, is considered inappropriate.

Around two hundred people used the “other” write in box to describe themselves as Gypsy/Romany/Traveller in 2001. This is known to be a significant undercount. A dedicated tick box may help counter under enumeration.

3.4 Care

Change: The ‘1-19 hours a week’ band has been broken down to ‘1-9 hours a week’ and ‘10-19 hours a week’.

Reason for change: The category ‘1-19 hours’ was too broad. In 2001, over 6% of people in Scotland provided 1 to 19 hours of care per week while only 1.2% provided 20 to 49 hours and 2.3% provided over 50 hours. By breaking down the categories further we should be able to understand better the distribution of hours spent caring.

3.5 Labour market questions routing

3.5 If you are aged 16 or over ➔ Go to 27

If you are aged 15 and under ➔ Go to 31

Change: Previously, only those aged between 16 and 75 were asked Labour Market Questions. The instruction has been changed to allow capture of data on all people aged 16 and over.

Reason for change: As people are now working later into their lives, the upper bound on age is no longer appropriate.

4. New Household Questions

4.1 Access to land

Purpose of question: The Crofters Commission requested a question on crofting. Such a question would not be widely applicable across Scotland. Crofting is limited to certain rural communities in limited geographical areas.

In the 1997 Census Test a question on access to a garden was included. The case for such a question relates to housing deprivation, i.e. it identifies households with children which lacked this amenity. We propose that merging the two issues may provide an acceptable compromise.

4.2 Is this dwelling in need of any repairs?

◆ Do not include desirable remodelling or additions.

- No, only **regular maintenance** is needed (painting, etc.)
- Yes, **minor repairs** are needed (missing or loose floor tiles, bricks, defective steps, etc.)
- Yes, **major repairs** are needed (defective plumbing or electrical wiring, structural repairs to walls, floors or ceilings, etc.)

4.2 State of Repair

Purpose of questions:

To assess the general condition of accommodation.

If a central heating question is no longer required by 2011 this may provide an alternative to measure housing deprivation in the Census.

4.3 Eating together

GROS ran a competition in two Glasgow schools to devise a new Census question. This is one of two questions chosen to appear in the 2006 Census Test.

The questions were chosen for their originality, relevance to young people and the usefulness of the social data they would capture.

There is some research which indicates that children who regularly eat with their families eat more nutritional food, are less likely to have behavioural problems and have improved literacy skills.

As the question is particularly sensitive, 50% of 2006 test forms will contain a version of this question, in order to evaluate the effect on response rate.

Purpose of question:

The Scottish Executive strives to combat discrimination based on a person's ethnicity, disability, gender, sexual orientation, age or religion.

Sexual orientation is the only major equality issue not represented in the Census. There is no national data on the number of Lesbian, Gay or Bi-sexual people in Scotland.
